New Programs Part of Ontario's Business Growth Initiative

Ontario is introducing two new programs to support job creation and economic growth by helping small- and medium-sized businesses across the province compete globally and keep pace with rapid technological change.

- Ontario will invest \$32.4 million over four years for the Scale-Up Voucher Program, and \$28.8 million over five years for the Small Business Innovation Challenge.
- These initiatives are part of Ontario's five year, \$400-million <u>Business Growth Initiative</u>, which is helping to grow the economy and create jobs by promoting an innovation-based economy, helping small companies scale-up and modernizing regulations for businesses.
- High-growth companies with 20 to 100 per cent growth each year create half of all net new jobs in Ontario.
- The Small Business Innovation Challenge is modelled after successful programs in the United Kingdom and the United States.

These new programs are part of the 2016 Ontario Economic Outlook and Fiscal Review:

- The Small Business Innovation Challenge will provide small- and medium-sized businesses with opportunities to develop and implement innovative technology solutions to public sector challenges. Through real-world testing of products and solutions, companies will be better positioned to market their new ideas to the world and help foster longterm economic growth.
- The Scale-Up Voucher program will provide high-growth companies with immediate access to specific resources they need at pivotal moments in their development. Vouchers will be used by companies to fund activities such as specialized talent development and recruitment, accessing new markets and intellectual property protection services.



Ontario Trillium Foundation announces 2017 Granting application deadlines

The deadlines were revealed as part of a plan that extends recent reform initiatives to ensure OTF operations are more streamlined, simplified and responsive to the needs of community organizations.

This plan builds on the successful <u>outcomes-based investment strategy</u> launched last year and reflects feedback from key stakeholders.

OTF will shift to a single deadline per year for three of its four investment streams:

- Seed February 22nd
- Grow June 28th
- Capital- October 25th

Applications for Collective Impact grants will continue to be accepted year-round.

The move to a single deadline will provide a number of benefits to potential applicants including access to enhanced support and an even more focused and streamlined process. In addition, this move will provide Northern and rural Ontario with better access to a larger funding allocation.

In addition to these four investments streams, eligible community organizations will continue to have access to other programs administered by OTF, such as the <u>Youth Opportunities Fund</u> and the <u>Local Poverty Reduction</u> <u>Fund</u>. Canada's Volunteer Awards Program

Canada's Volunteer Awards (CVA) program is about recognizing the enormous contributions that volunteers, not-forprofit organizations and businesses across the country make to help people and their communities. The Awards are about people working in partnerships to find new solutions to strengthen our country.

The goal of the awards is to inspire Canadians from all walks of life to find new ways of making a difference in their communities.

Canada's Volunteer Awards recipients are nominated by Canadians, for Canadians. This year, 21 awards will be presented, and award recipients will have the chance to identify a not-for-profit organization of their choice to receive a \$5,000 or \$10,000 grant.

Awards will be presented in the following categories:



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One (1) national award – Thérèse Casgrain Lifelong Achievement Award.

Five (5) regional awards – Emerging Leader, for young volunteers aged 18 to 30.

Five (5) regional awards – Community Leader, for individuals or groups of volunteers.

Five (5) regional awards - Business Leader, to recognize businesses that demonstrate social responsibility.

Five (5) regional awards – **Social Innovator**, to recognize the contributions of not-for-profit organizations.

The Government of Canada is proud to acknowledge young volunteers. In honour of the 150th anniversary of Confederation in 2017, the Emerging Leader category will be expanded from one national to five regional awards in order to recognize young volunteers' contributions to their communities.

CFDC SUCCESS STORIES- Way to Go!

WonTon Crunch Inc. is a story of dedication, patience, perseverance, engagement and repatriation, immigrant entrepreneur, innovation, invention, quality control, and a commitment to excellence on every level (product, technology, process, administration, communication and community). They are a client of the **Valley Heartland CFDC**.



When Prim Singh started making wontons out of his Smiths Falls' garage, he never thought his passion would grow into a multi-million dollar family-run business – Wonton Crunch. Singh had been making wontons for over three decades, but in 2008 his passion went into full-throttle. They are the only producer of fresh frozen wontons in North America.

Singh and his family were featured on CBC's Dragons' Den for the <u>second time</u> on Nov. 2. But this time, instead of asking the dragons for money, **he showcased the family's self-made success.** The first time they appeared on the show, Jim Treliving, the owner of Boston Pizza, offered the Singhs \$70,000 for 30% of the company, but once the product was successfully tested with Boston Pizza, Treliving came back to Singh and offered the family a large sum of money for 51 per cent of the company.

While it was an attractive offer, Singh decided he'd go it alone and keep Wonton Crunch as a family business. And despite declining the dragon's offer, the company continued to grow with no investors and a lot of hard work.

Wonton Crunch is now worth an estimated \$1.8 million. Singh, who used to work at the Hershey's plant as a janitor before it closed down, said he feels good to hire locally – especially due to the tough economic times Smiths Falls has faced in recent years.

The company will be shipping across North America in the next year and has its sights set on the international market.

Singh said it's important to keep Smiths Falls as Wonton Crunch's home base, which is good news considering Singh projects his company will be worth well over \$10 million in the next five years.

Techsoup Canada helps nonprofits, charities and libraries achieve greater impact. They do this by connecting nonprofit organizations with affordable technologies, so they can invest the majority of their resources into what counts: their mission.

The technology donation program offers donated and discounted technologies to qualified charities, nonprofits and libraries for an administrative fee that's typically 90% less than market value. Qualified organizations can order donated and discounted software, such as <u>Microsoft Office</u>, <u>Bitdefender Anti-Virus</u>, and <u>ReadyTalk</u>, through this program.

How Can My Organization Get Started?

- Register Your Organization Your organization needs to be a Canadian charity, federal or provincial nonprofit organization or public library. Individuals cannot register.
- 2. Submit Qualification Documents Nonprofits will need to provide copies of your official documents for verification purposes. You will also be contacted you if they require any further documentation to verify your status, budget, address, or activities.
- Request Products
 To your organization, accessing the technology donations program will look a lot a regular online store. You'll be able to pick out products you're eligible for, add them to your cart, and check out.

CFLI Program Certification Streams

The Board Professional Development series includes 13 modules on a range of topics. These modules are delivered face-to-face, through video conferencing, or by streaming online video. You can choose the modules that are most relevant to you and the delivery model that works best for you.

In addition to being able to obtain a certificate for each module, as a Community Futures Board (or staff) member you can now earn **a program certificate in any of these streams.**

- » Leadership

What are the differences between majority female-owned and majority male-owned businesses in Canada?

The Small Business Branch of Innovation, Science and Economic Development has just published the report A Comparison of the Performance of Majority Female-Owned and Majority Male-Owned Small and Medium-Sized Enterprises.



Using the Survey on Financing and Growth of Small and Medium Enterprises 2011 and 2014, the report reveals some differences between majority female-owned and majority male-owned enterprises. For example, the ratio of authorized to requested debt financing was lower for majority female-owned SMEs than for majority maleowned SMEs and the interest rate on debt financing for majority female owned SMEs was higher than that for majority male-owned SMEs in 2011. This suggests that financial institutions considered requests for debt financing for majority femaleowned SMEs to be more risky than for majority male-owned SMEs.

However, in 2014, findings suggest that requests for debt financing for majority female-owned and majority male-owned SMEs were viewed as being equally risky as the ratio of authorized to requested debt financing and the interest rate on debt financing were not significantly different.
